He was also in the British battleship HMS HOWE supporting the fierce fighting neutralising Japanese positions when the US Marines came ashore at *The Battle of Okinawa* on 1st April 1945.



- * LIFE MEMBERSHIP. We need to firm up the parameters for Life Membership of the Association.

- * WEBSITE BIO'S. We need to input bio's of 7RAR legends before we lose their stories.
- * MEMORABILIA. Can we ensure our memorabilia (the brass pig) remains intact and secure.
- * RED FRIDAY BADGES & CAR STICKERS. I suggest we resolve to move the current stock and renew both for our 50th Anniversary in 2015.
- * GURKHAS. Continue to support these old soldiers with a raffle and a genuine Nepalese Kukri as the main prize at Reunions.
- * VIETNAM ENTERTAINERS. Continue to support, Sylvia Raye, Dina Lee, Lorrae Desmond and others.
- * 7RAR 'OLD SOLDIERS'. Always support them, especially those in need.
- * ANZAC DAY LUNCH (Sydney). Work towards a common venue.
- * 7RAR NEWSLETTER. Needs more support, input, editing and proof-reading.
- * REUNION 2015. Ensure it's video'd for posterity & 7RAR history. (\$10-15 a DVD)

Webmasters Report

By nature of my interests I am web centric and I do appreciate not all members of the executive are but you need to be aware that a lot of our members refer to the site regularly and as such it is an important communication tool.

Stats

The website draws between 1,000 and 15,000 visitors per month. That's visitors, not hits and is a true reflection of how many people visit the site. Hits to date for 2014 are nearly three quarters of a million while visits total 55,000 for the same period.

The top country visitors are China, Australia, Ukraine, USA, Russia and France in that order.

The top ten downloads are all Newsletters with the latest newsletter being downloaded 118 times.

Future Development.

The biggest short-fall in the website is a lack of Nominal Rolls and other input for East Timor, Timor Leste, Afghanistan and Iraq. The Vietnam Nominal Roll is consistently the biggest draw-card to the website and I can only imagine the same would apply for post-Vietnam tours, if I had the data. I have approached the Battalion but, understandably, they have other priorities.

Notwithstanding that fact there will be soldiers of all ranks now in less demanding jobs or discharged who could drag out the rolls. Maybe one of these soldiers could even put up his hand to help me get it together.

The site needs more input from the current generation. Considering it was developed while 7RAR was off the ORBAT, and, that the webmaster is a Vietnam Vet, then it is understandable, however I continue to feel the site doesn't cover the full range of our unquestionable proud service.

It is almost criminal that we don't have a book on the history of the battalion, such as Mike O'Brien's, available for sale.

I now have the book available on DVD and soon as an e-book but can we look at doing another edition. I know Mike and his old publishers aren't contemplating a reprint but it is the definitive book on 7RAR in Vietnam and we almost owe it to the country to do it.

Governments are, or were, throwing money at veterans. Do we have a member in the know on government grants?

The website could be a store front for 7RAR with everything you wanted to know about the battalion either available for perusal or by purchase of a book or books. We can do a deal with guys who have written books and market them through the website as well.

I said the above last year but got no interest. I repeat the point because I think it has merit.

Some discussion has been had dealing with the distribution of funds from reunions, e.g. 25% to the conducting state/org and 75% to the Association.

Also as indicated in the newsletter we are looking for assistants to the three positions that are mostly exposed to the membership, i.e. Executive Officer/Editor, Treasurer and the Secretary/Webmaster. ALL NOMINATIONS MUST BE RECEIVED BY THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER NOT LESS THE FOUR (4) WEEKS PRIOR TO THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OR AN EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING.

THE MEMBER PROPOSED FOR LIFE MEMBERSHIP MUST NOT AT TIME OF ELECTION OWE ANY MONIES TO THE ASSOCIATION.

THE RESOLUTION MUST BE PASSED BY NO LESS THE 75% OF THE MEMBERS PRESENT AT THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OR MORE PREFERABLY AT THE EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING HELD DURING OUR REUNIONS WHEN MORE OF THE MEMBERSHIP IS PRESENT.

(h) Membership Subscriptions:



9. The President declared the meeting closed at 1500hrs.


VIETNAM VETERAN'S DAY SYDNEY





<u>Update to Reunion 2015 - 'ANZAC to Adelaide'</u>

Lots of things have been happening down here, and most have been covered in our monthly update newsletters which I send out to all whose email address I have – at the current time this is about 580 members, so with partners, this means that probably in excess of 900 people get an update every month or so.

As you probably know by now, we have been having a lot of problems with the State government, and particularly with one of their subcontractors - Spotless Services.

Spotless Services administer the Torrens Parade Ground and adjacent parks for the government, and they are 'bloody-minded' about how flexible they are. They exhibit behaviour which emulates the short-sightedness of lots of bureaucrats who have a small amount of authority, and who seemingly like to wield it at their whim.

One of the major issues has been that their on-site administrator has repeatedly stated that he can't take bookings for the Parade Ground any further than 12 months ahead, yet has gone and booked two other events for the next three years or so. After much negotiation and correspondence backwards and forwards, we found ourselves no further forward on this issue, and unable to lock-in a venue for the Sunday. This was further exacerbated by the State government then deciding that they would use the Parade ground as a parking lot for whenever there is any event on at the revamped Adelaide Oval, thereby adding even further doubt on the availability of the venue.

Therefore, we approached the Keswick Army Barracks about using their facilities, and were overwhelmed by the enthusiasm and support offered to us by the RSM Adrian Hodges, and the command staff at Keswick. Because of this, we have therefore moved all the Sunday activities to Keswick Army Barracks, and now have reassurance of a more than adequate venue, without the issues of security, toilets, parking, or liquor licensing – a much better outcome all round.

We have also negotiated another – and better event – also at Keswick Barracks, which will run alongside the Adelaide Oval tour. See below:

NEW EVENT!

We are really pleased to announce that we have successfully negotiated another tour for the reunion - this one is of the Army Museum at Keswick Barracks, which is only a couple of kilometres out of the central business district of Adelaide, and well-serviced by buses and trains, so access is no problem.

The Keswick Army Museum is rated as the best Military Museum in Australia, after the AWM, and what they have on show is impressive.











Not only will the tour take in the museum and its exhibits, but will also include a History tour of the barracks, static displays of military arms and vehicles, and excitingly, a full tour of the 'sheds' where all the items that can't fit into the museum are stored. Some of these items go back to the First World War and beyond, and are normally not available for viewing.



As well, there will be a 'gourmet BBQ thrown in, and beer in the Sergeants Mess at a couple of dollars each - something to moisten those parched throats.

Note: Any members who have already registered and nominated to attend the Adelaide Oval Tour, but who would now prefer to go on the Army Museum Tour instead, simply drop me an email and I will change your preference for you.

Also, as we get closer to the event, we have taken steps to minimise last-minute confusion (for ourselves) and have decided to close off registrations at the end of next March, and are no longer accepting any new periodical payments – all registrations from now will have to be fully paid at time of registering. Some members are still wanting to register and pay later, but this is causing extra work, and we will only accept future registrations which are accompanied by the full fees – see below:

REGISTRATION

A couple of very important items to pass on about registration and attendance at the Reunion.

- First We have decided to close off registration at the end of MARCH 2015. This gives everyone wishing to attend the Reunion plenty of time to think about it and get their registrations in, and gives us the necessary time to close off bookings, and make final preparations. We know that some will not be happy with this decision, but listening to the urging of our peers in both Victoria and Western Australia and taking on-board their experiences with reunion bookings we feel that this still gives everyone ample time to register if intending to come and also allows us time to finalize everything before the actual event.
- There will be NO registrations accepted after the end of March 2015.
- Second As we are now only a bit over twelve months away from closing the books, it has now become impractical to continue to offer Periodical Payments for new registrants, so we have now closed the Periodical Payment option.
- Third As we stated earlier, we are actively working to reduce the costs as much as possible, and all savings will be passed on to members. Currently, pricing for Single members is \$335.00 instead of \$375 and pricing for Couples has also dropped, and is now set at \$660 instead of \$720 as previously announced. This is due to what we believe are two important considerations, one being that the ladies never drink as much as the men, and secondly, we believe that we need to pay back some of the wonderful support our partners have given us over the years. As sponsors come on board, we hope to be able to reduce costs even further.

At present time we have 162 people registered to attend the reunion, and strongly urge members thinking of attending to register as soon as possible. Numbers are limited for specific events, so if you don't want to miss out, register now.

We have also made arrangements with Keswick barracks to facilitate the battalion so they can conduct a full Drum-Head ceremony on the Sunday, and they are also helping facilitate our requirements for bands, pipers, and buglers.

Further, we are negotiating with the Officer's Mess at Keswick to hold a 'get-together' for officers – past and present – on the Thursday evening.

In conclusion, all information is – as has been – available on our web-page at www.7rarsa.asn.au and members are strongly urged to visit the site and have a look.



Just a quick update this month to let everyone know that things are going reasonably smoothly (waiting for the bump, though) and we are starting to be able to 'tick' off a lot of the events – at least as far as locking them in is concerned. With "colour sergeant" Chris O'Neil out on the day, President Chris Ashenden was volunteered to call the step. Fortunately the parade marched at a steady pace as (young Nasho) Chris's "Halt" commands were nowhere near the calibre of those of (mature Reg.) Chris. Someone was heard to say at the conclusion of the march "If O'Neil's not here next year to keep the unit in order I'll kill the bastard!"

Having said that after the march there was a good mix of current and past members of the Battalion lunching at the Lion. Onyx was in attendance and received much attention from Battalion personnel and other members of the Royal Australian Regiment as well as the general public. It will be interesting what happens at the march in 2015.

SUOI CHAU PHA

Members of the 7 RAR family, old and young, male and female joined at the Vietnam Veterans' Memorial, Torrens Parade Ground to honour members of the battalion Killed in Action over that past 100 years.

In welcoming the 50 plus attendees Association President Chris Ashenden briefly reflected on the origins of the Battalion – being formed by Lt Col H. E. "Pompey" Elliot in the early days of August 1914. Nine months later it was bloodied and proven with the Anzac Landing. On this day, 6 August, in 1915 it joined the Battle of Lone Pine where 4 members of the Battalion were awarded the Victoria Cross. 1045 members were killed and 2076 were wounded in that First World War of 4 years in the hell holes of Gallipoli and the Western Front.

Just over 21 years later the 2nd 7th was formed. In 5 years of heavy fighting in conditions as diverse as the dry deserts around Egypt to the wet tropical jungles of Papua New Guinea 226 men of the battalion were killed and 473 wounded.

The Battalion's current C.O., Lt Col Malcolm Wells, related the significance of Suoi Chau Pha and the other actions in South Vietnam to the current soldiers of the Battalion.

The flags were lowered to half mast and the catafalque party of current serving soldiers of the Seventh took their place around the memorial. Selected action reports from both tours of Vietnam were read, each followed by reciting the names of those dying in Vietnam. Events surrounding the fight in which Corporal Matthew Hopkins was killed in Afghanistan in 2009 were read.

Following the laying of wreaths, reciting the Ode, playing of the Last Post and Rouse by Bugler Paul Bampton (of the Australian Army Band, Adelaide), the observance of 2 minutes silence honouring all killed and subsequently dying of wounds of war, and other relevant observances, Piper Des Ross played the lament.

At the end of the service and after personal reflection there was an adjournment to the London Tavern for toast to "The Battalion" and "Absent Comrades". Over drinks and a meal the various genders of soldiers past and present and accompanying family members enjoyed each other's company and discussed issues of mutual relevance – a number of which have not changed substantially over the past 5 decades.

Gallipoli August Offensive Battlefield Tour 29 July – 11 August 2015

Day 1. Wednesday 29 July

Afternoon departure for tour members via Singapore Airlines.

Day 2. Thursday 30 July

Upon arrival in Istanbul you will be met by your local guide and transferred to your hotel. Check into hotel and freshen up for lunch. This afternoon we enjoy a cruise along the Bosphorus, seeing beautiful mosques, palaces and old wooden houses on both the European and Asian shoreline.

Evening: Tour welcome dinner at the hotel.

Overnight: ISTANBUL B L D

Day 3. Friday 31 July

Begin today with a guided tour of famous sights of the old city, including the Hippodrome, the beautiful Blue Mosque and the Basilica Cistern. Following lunch at Konyali restaurant overlooking the Bosphorus inside the grounds of Topkapi Palace, explore the Palace, the main residence of the Ottoman Sultans for over 400 years.

This morning we enjoy a special highlight boat tour along the Gallipoli coastline from Anzac Cove to Suvla Bay for an unforgettable view of the ridges and valleys from the sea, just as the Anzacs would have seen it on the landing 100 years ago. (weather permitting).

Lunch at the hotel.

This afternoon we drive along the coast for our first visit to the Anzac beaches to discuss the landings, including a walk up to Plugges Plateau for a wonderful overview. We will visit Ari Burnu Cemetery, where the Dawn Service was held until 2000, Beach Cemetery and the grave of John Simpson Kirkpatrick, "the man with the donkey", and Anzac Cove.

Evening: Dinner at the hotel.

Day 6. Monday 03 August

This morning we head to the southern tip of the peninsula for a guided tour of the landings at Cape Helles and the Krithia Battlefield. Visit the huge Turkish Memorial and "S" Beach at Morto Bay, and "V" Beach, the planned main British landing.

Lunch will be at a local restaurant overlooking the Aegean, followed by a visit to Redoubt Cemetery for a discussion of the attack on Krithia by the 2nd Australian Infantry Brigade.

Evening: Dinner at the hotel.

Day 7. Tuesday 04 August

Begin today with a guided tour of the ANZAC front line from Lone Pine, Johnston's Jolly, Steele's and Courtney's Posts to Quinn's Post, considered the key to the ANZAC beachhead.

Lunch at the hotel.

This afternoon we begin our in-depth consideration of the August Offensive - plan, objectives, successes and failures.

We drive to Suvla Bay to discuss the British IX Corps landings, seeing Fisherman's Hut on the way. We return to the hotel via the village of Bigali, headquarters location of Lieutenant Colonel Mustafa Kemal's 19th Division on 25 April 1915.

Evening: Dinner at Hotel.

Overnight: GALLIPOLI

Day 8. Wednesday 05 August

This morning we return to Second Ridge to discuss the 1st Brigade attack at Lone Pine and the subsequent attacks on German Officer's Trench and The Chessboard.

Lunch at the hotel.

This afternoon we visit Walkers Ridge and Russell's Top, before discussing the disastrous attacks at The Nek and Chunuk Bair.

Evening: Dinner at hotel.

Overnight: GALLIPOLI

Day 9. Thursday 06 August

This morning we have the option of two historical walks. You may choose to walk down Rhododendron Ridge, the New Zealand infantry's approach route in their assault on Chunuk Bair, with a short side trip to the Farm Cemetery. The other walk is down Artillery Road, the supply route developed for the attack at Lone Pine, to the beach. On the way visit Shell Green Cemetery where the famous cricket match was played in December 1915.

After rest in the afternoon, this evening we will return to Lone Pine for a special commemorative service.

Evening: Dinner at the hotel.

Day 10. Friday 07 August

Begin today with a first-light commemorative service at The Nek, scene of the tragic charge by the 3rd Light Horse Brigade. Later in the morning we drive to Canakkale where, after lunch, we will visit Troy for a guided tour of the ruins of this ancient city, or an optional free afternoon, to visit the fortress and naval museum, taking the opportunity to see the replica of the Turkish minelayer Nusret that laid the mines in the Dardanelles, causing so much damage to the allied navies.

Evening: Dinner at leisure in one of the many waterfront restaurants in Canakkale, before returning to the hotel.

Overnight: GALLIPOLI B L

Day 11. Saturday 08 August

Today we leave the battlefield behind for the return trip to Istanbul, with lunch en route at Kosk restaurant. This afternoon visit the Grand Bazaar with over 4000 stalls for shopping and souvenir hunting.

Evening: Dinner at the hotel.

Overnight: ISTANBUL B L D

Day 12. Sunday 09 August

After breakfast, we visit Hagia Sophia, one of the great marvels of architecture and the most important Byzantine monument in Istanbul. The remainder of the day is free for final shopping and souvenir hunting. Lunch own arrangements.
